A. Client and Witness Interviews

Level of preparation needed to minimize chance of having client or witness lie;

Approach to interview: whether alone, with or without taking notes, and/or making a record of the interview;

Difference, if any, between a client and witness interview;

Most important factors and goals in any interview;

Reliability of non-verbal or verbal tells at this stage;

Importance, if any, of witness characteristics (e.g., age, race, ethnicity, educational background);

Different approaches between a witness and a client; and Strategies and techniques for extracting the truth and exposing lies

B. Depositions and Trials

Are there identifiable characteristics of a witness lying under oath at a deposition or trial?

> Verbal and non-verbal "tells" during testimony; How do cues influence the approach to a witness?

When dealing with a potential lying witness, what are the differences between deposition and trial?

Differences in goals? Differences in approach?

How do you make sure the judge or jury knows that a witness has lied?

Attacking the witness? Direct accusation of lies? Repetitive questioning? Closing argument?

C. Judge's Findings of Fact

Fact finder's focus and strategies; Role of behavioral or non-verbal cues; Characteristics of lies and liars; Characteristics of honest witnesses and truthful testimony; Judicial reaction – questioning and intervention;

Role of prior inconsistent statements; Biases and prejudices; and Tips and traps.
